

Marshbrook First School, SEND Information Report

September 2022-23

Following the guidelines provided by the government, which can be found below:

- Children will have access to their relevant curriculum through planned lessons, set by class teachers, which take into account the need for a 'recovery curriculum'. To cover any knowledge and skills missed during Covid-19 pandemic as well as any well-being needs children may have.
- Children will have access to some of the provisions listed in the SEND provision section of the SEND information report.
These include:
 - Activities linked to their EHCP.
 - Visual supports such as visual timetables, working memory boards, now and next cards.
 - Coloured overlays, ear defenders and sensory boxes.
 - Technology, where appropriate.
 - Online provision, such as, Active learn, Timetable rockstars, Nesy and Spelling shed.

The offer shown below applies to any children that may need to be taught remotely.

Interventions will take place within bubbles.

As stated in the government guidance:

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'Where a class, group or small number of pupils need to self-isolate, or there is a local lockdown requiring pupils to remain at home, we expect schools to have the capacity to offer immediate remote education'

Should there be a case for children to work from home, Marshbrook will ensure:

- Work will be set by class teachers. It will take into account the needs of pupils in their classes and will follow a well-sequences curriculum so that knowledge and skills are built incrementally, with a good level of clarity about what is intended to be taught and practised in each subject.
- Class teachers will set work and provide resources for individual SEND children relating to the outcomes/targets on their EHCP/SEND support plans, where appropriate.
- We will provide printed resources, such a workbooks and worksheets for children who do not have suitable online learning.

External agencies will become involved if necessary following the usual graduated response process detailed above.

Transition

We are aware that the transition period for our pupils with SEND has been greatly affected by the current situation. All class teachers have engaged in handover meetings with the incoming class teacher as well as the SENCo where relevant. We also continue to work alongside our First school/Primary colleagues to ensure that the information needed is shared and any children needing enhanced transition will receive it.

Aims of this Report

1) Aims of our provision in regards to pupils with special educational needs and/or disability

The aims of our policy and practice in relation to special educational need and disability in this school are:

- To make reasonable adjustments for those with a disability by taking action to increase access to the curriculum, the environment and to printed information for all.
- To ensure that children and young people with SEND engage in the activities of the school alongside pupils who do not have SEN.
- To reduce barriers to progress by embedding the principles in the National Curriculum Inclusion statement

- To use our best endeavours to secure special educational provision for pupils for whom this is required, that is “additional to and different from” that provided within the differentiated curriculum, to better respond to the four broad areas of need:
 1. Communication and interaction,
 2. Cognition and learning,

3. Social, mental and emotional health,

4. Sensory/physical.

- To request, monitor and respond to parent/carers' and pupils' views in order to evidence high levels of confidence and partnership.
- To ensure a high level of staff expertise to meet pupil need, through well-targeted continuing professional development.
- To support pupils with medical conditions to achieve full inclusion in all school activities by ensuring consultation with health and social care professionals in order to meet the medical needs of pupils.
- To work in cooperative and productive partnership with the Local Authority and other outside agencies, to ensure there is a multi-professional approach to meeting the needs of all vulnerable learners.

2) What are special educational needs (SEN) or a disability?

At our school we use the definition for SEN and for disability from the SEND Code of Practice (2014). This states:

- **Special Educational Needs:** *A child or young person has special educational needs if he or she has a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for him or her.*
- *A learning difficulty or disability is a **significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age.***
- *Special educational provision means **educational or training provision that is additional to, or different from,** that made generally for others of the same age in a mainstream setting in England*

Disability: *Many children and young people who have SEN may have a disability under the Equality Act 2010 – that is ‘...**a physical or mental impairment which has a long-term and substantial adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities**’. This definition includes sensory impairments such as those affecting sight or hearing, and long-term health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, epilepsy, and cancer.*

3) The kinds of special educational needs (SEN) for which provision is made at the school

- Children and young people with SEN have different needs, but the general presumption is that all children with SEN but without an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) are welcome to apply for a place at our school, in line with the school admissions policy. If a place is available, we will undertake to use our best endeavours, in partnership with parents, to make the provision required to meet the SEN of pupils at this school.
- For children with an EHCP, parents have the right to request a particular school and the local authority must comply with that preference and name the school or college in the EHC plan unless:
 - o it would be unsuitable for the age, ability, aptitude or SEN of the child or young person, or
 - o the attendance of the child or young person there would be incompatible with the efficient education of others, or the efficient use of resources.

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- Before making the decision to name our school in a child’s EHCP, the local authority will send the governing body a copy of the EHCP and then consider their comments very carefully before a final decision on placement is made. In addition, the local authority must also seek the agreement of school where the draft EHCP sets out any provision to be delivered on their premises that have been secured through a direct payment (personal budget).

4) How does our school know if children need extra help?

We know when a pupil needs help if:

- Concerns are raised by parents/carers, external agencies, teachers, the pupil’s previous school or the pupil themselves, regarding concerns relating to inadequate levels of progress or inclusion.
- Screening, such as that completed on entry or as a result of a concern being raised, indicates gap in knowledge and/or skills.
- Whole school tracking of attainment outcomes indicates lack of expected rate of progress.
- Observation of the pupil indicates that they have additional needs

What should I do if I think my child may have special educational needs?

- If you have concerns, then please firstly discuss these with your child's teacher. This, then, may result in a referral to the school SENDCo whose name is Mrs Williams and whose contact details are 01785712780 and email: j-williams@penkvalley.co.uk
- All parents will be listened to. Their views and aspirations for their child will be central to the assessment and provision that is made by the school.

6) How will the school support a child with SEND?

All pupils will be provided with high quality teaching that is differentiated to meet the needs of all learners. The quality of classroom teaching provided to pupils with SEND is monitored through a number of processes that include:

- classroom observation by the senior leadership team, the SENCo, external verifiers,
- ongoing assessment of progress made by pupils with SEND,
- work sampling and scrutiny of planning to ensure effective matching of work to pupil need,
- teacher meetings with the SENCo to provide advice and guidance on meeting the needs of pupils with SEND,
- pupil and parent feedback on the quality and effectiveness of interventions provided, attendance and behaviour records.
- All children who receive SEN support will have a SEN support plan that will monitor progress and state the child's personalised targets. These are set by the class teacher/SENCO in response to the child's needs. These documents will be reviewed three times a year.

Pupils with a disability will be provided with reasonable adjustments (such as auxiliary aids and services) to overcome any disadvantage experienced in schools and increase their access to the taught curriculum.

- All pupils have individual national curriculum targets set in line with national outcomes to ensure ambition. Parents are informed of these via the reporting system and also at events such as Parents' Evenings.
- Pupils' attainments are tracked using the whole school tracking system and those failing to make expected levels of progress are identified very quickly. These pupils are then discussed in termly progress meetings that are undertaken between the class/subject teacher and a member of the Senior Leadership team and if appropriate, the pupil themselves.
- Additional action to increase the rate of progress will be then identified and recorded that will include a review of the impact of the differentiated teaching being provided to the child, and if required, provision to the teacher of additional strategies to further support the success of the pupil.
- Where it is decided during this early discussion that special educational provision is required to support increased rates, parents will be informed that the school considers their child may require SEN support and their partnership sought in order to improve attainments.

Action relating to SEN support will follow an assess, plan, do and review model:

- **Assess:** Data on the pupil held by the school will be collated by the class/subject teacher/SENCo in order to make an accurate assessment of the pupil's needs. Parents will always be invited to this early discussion to support the identification of action to improve outcomes.

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- **Plan:** If review of the action taken indicates that “additional to and different from” support will be required, then the views of all involved including the parents and the pupil will be obtained and appropriate evidence-based interventions identified, recorded and implemented by the class/subject teacher with advice from the SENCo.
- **Do:** SEN support will be recorded on a support plan that will identify a clear set of expected outcomes, which will include stretching and relevant academic and developmental targets (this may include for young people, targets around preparing for adulthood) that take into account parents’ aspirations for their child. Parents and the pupil will also be consulted on the action they can take to support attainment of the desired outcomes. This will be recorded and a date made for reviewing attainment.
- **Review:** Progress towards these outcomes will be tracked and reviewed termly with the parents and the pupil.

If progress rates are judged to be inadequate despite the delivery of high quality interventions, advice will always be sought from external agencies regarding strategies to best meet the specific needs of a pupil. This will only be undertaken after parent permission has been obtained and may include referral to:

1. Behaviour Support Service
2. Dyslexia Centres or their Outreach Support Team
3. Autism Outreach Team
4. Hearing Impairment Team
5. Visual Impairment Team
6. Educational Psychology Service
7. Local Support Team
8. Physical and Disability Support Service
9. Social Services
10. School Nurse
11. CAMHS (Child & Adolescent Mental Health Service)
12. SENSS (Special Educational Needs Support service)

13. Midlands Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (MPFT)

14. Speech and language team

N.B. For a very small percentage of pupils, whose needs are significant and complex and the SEN Support required to meet their needs cannot reasonably be provided from within the school's own resources, a request will be made to the local authority to conduct an assessment of education, health and care needs. This may result in an Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan being provided.

7) How will pupils be involved in decisions regarding provision that can better meet their needs?

Marshbrook will discuss provision with the children when their support plans are created. They will also have a voice during the termly review.

8) How will the curriculum be matched to each child's needs?

Teachers plan using pupils' achievement levels, differentiating tasks to ensure progress for every pupil in the classroom.

- When a pupil has been identified as having special educational needs, the curriculum and the learning environment will be further adapted by the class teacher to reduce barriers to learning and enable them to access the curriculum more easily.
- These adaptations may include strategies suggested by the Special Educational Needs Coordinator (SENCo) and/or external specialists.
- In addition if it is considered appropriate, pupils may be provided with specialised equipment or resources such as ICT and/or additional adult help.
- All actions taken by the class teacher will be recorded and shared with parents.

9) How will parents know how their child is doing?

- Attainments towards the identified outcomes will be shared with parents termly through feedback regarding SEN support reviews but also through the school reporting system and Parents' Evenings.
- Parents are encouraged to arrange an appointment to discuss their child's progress with the class/subject teacher, the SENCo, a member of the senior leadership team at any time when they feel concerned or have information they feel they would like to share that could impact on their child's success. Please contact the school office who will arrange this appointment for you.

10) How will parents be helped to support their child's learning?

- The class/subject teacher or SENCo may also suggest additional ways of supporting your child's learning.

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- If you would like ideas on support that you would like to have access to in order to further support your child's learning, please contact the SENCo who will locate information and guidance for you in this area.

11) How will the school evaluate the effectiveness of the SEN provision made for pupils?

- The effectiveness of SEN provision will be measured using both qualitative and quantitative data. Qualitative data will gather the views of parents and pupils on how successful the provision has been in enabling them to attain their outcomes. Quantitative data will examine both progress and attainment levels compared to those achieved nationally for pupils with the same level prior learning level. This data will be shared termly with governors and be judged by external moderators such as Ofsted.
- Interventions are reviewed at least every term to look at impact.

12) What support will there be for children overall well-being

The school offers a wide variety of pastoral support for pupils. This includes:

- PHSE – Jigsaw scheme of work.
- Small group evidence-led interventions to support pupil's well-being are delivered to targeted pupils and groups.

13) Pupils with medical needs

☒ Pupils with medical needs will be provided with a detailed Individual Health and Care Plan, compiled in partnership with the school nurse and parents and if appropriate, the pupil themselves.

☒ Staff who volunteer to administer and supervise medications, will complete formal training and be verified by the school nurse as being competent.

☒ All medicine administration procedures adhere to the LA policy and Department of Education (DfE) guidelines included within *Supporting pupils at school with medical conditions* (DfE) 2014 and identified in the School Medicine Administration Policy.

14) What specialist services are available at the school?

The school has access to a range of specialist support that are identified in (6) above.

15) What training do the staff supporting children and young people with SEND undertake?

Awareness training has been provided to all staff on:

- Dyslexia Friendly
- Sensory play
- Attachment
- Tier 1 Autism AET

Specialist training has been provided to the SENCo on:

- The SEN Coordination award (post graduate)
- Level 7 assessor – PAPP (post graduate)

The school has regular visits from SEN specialists, such as Autism outreach, who provide advice to staff support the success and progress of individual pupils. The NHS Speech Language Therapist visits to assess and plan support for targeted pupils. These programmes are then delivered by a trained Teaching Assistant.

16) How will my child be included in activities outside the classroom including school visits?

- Risk assessments are carried out and procedures are put in place to enable all children to participate in all school activities.
- The school ensures it has sufficient staff expertise to ensure that no child with SEND is excluded from any school provided activity.

17) How accessible is the school environment?

- Disabled parking can use the staff car park on request.
- One toilet has been adapted to ensure accessibility for visitors or children with a disability.
- all classrooms are at one level so can be reached by anybody in a wheel chair.

Our Accessibility Plan describes the actions the school has taken to increase access to the environment, the curriculum and to printed information is available via the school website.

18) How will the school prepare/support my child when joining or transferring to a new school?

A number of strategies are in place to enable effective pupils' transition. These include:

On entry:

- A planned transition takes place in the summer term for pupils starting school in September.
- Parent/carers are invited to a meeting at the school and are provided with a range of information to support them in enabling their child to settle into the school routine.
- The SENCo can be available to meet new parents of pupils who are known to have SEND to allow concerns to be raised and solutions to any perceived challenges to be located prior to entry.
- If pupils are transferring from another setting, the previous school records will be requested immediately and a meeting set up with parents to identify and reduce any concerns.

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Staff will visit nursery settings to speak with the teacher/SENCo about the children. Staff will also make transition notes that are shared with key staff in preparations for the child's arrival.

Transition to the next school

- Parents will be encouraged to consider options for the next phase of education and the school will involve outside agencies, as appropriate, to ensure information is comprehensive but accessible.
- Parents will be enabled to consider options for the next phase of education and may like to take advantage of the support offered by the independent Staffordshire School Choice Service. - Accompanied visits to other providers may be arranged as appropriate.
- For pupils transferring to local schools, the SENCos of both schools will meet to discuss the needs of pupils with SEND in order to ensure a smooth transition.
- Children will be provided with visits to their next school to become familiar with the new environment and staff.
- Staff from the new school are invited to come and work with the children in their school

How are the school's resources allocated and matched to children's special educational needs?

- The school receives funding to respond to the needs of pupils with SEND from a number of sources that includes:
 1. A proportion of the funds allocated per pupil to the school to provide for their education called the Age Weighted Pupil Unit.
 2. The National SEN budget. This is a fund devolved to schools to support them to meet the needs of pupils with SEND.
 3. For those pupils with the most complex needs, the school may be allocated additional educational needs funding from the Local Authorities High Needs SEN Funding allocation.
- This funding is then used to provide the equipment and facilities to support pupils with special educational needs and disabilities through support that might include:
 1. Targeted differentiation to increase access to text (desk copies of information, work buddy, accessible text, IT e.g. read aloud software, different recording strategies, additional time etc..)
 2. In class, adult or peer support aimed at increasing skills in specific area of weakness (learning behaviours, organisation, etc)
 3. Out of class support (relationship building, social, emotional skill development,)
 4. Small group tuition to enable catch up (subject or targeted at additional need)

5. Specific support, advice and guidance is provided to parents and families to improve pupil's readiness for learning (relating to pupil's difficulties in attendance, behaviour, physiological and emotional needs etc)
6. Provision of specialist resources or equipment (use of ICT, sloping board, electronic versions of text etc)
7. Partnership working with other settings (shared resources e.g. Parent Liaison Worker; shared expertise: support from local special school on action to improve inclusion: shared alternative environments etc.)
8. Access to targeted before/after school clubs (breakfast, homework, clubs targeted at increasing resilience)
9. Access to the school nurse and wider health professional support (responding to mental and physical health issues, speech, language and communication needs, motor control and mobility needs)
10. Access to support from in-school sources e.g. learning mentors (peer or adult) or from charities (e.g. Action for Children) and community sources (e.g. Youth and Church groups, local businesses)
11. Implementation of strategies from support agencies e.g. Behaviour Support/Educational Welfare Support

What interventions and support are available to help my child?

Wave 2 Support in small groups

- Motor skills – fine and gross
- Handwriting
- Phonics
- Touch Typing
- Spelling

Wave 3 support 1:1

- 1:1 TA support
- Precision teaching
- Toe by Toe

In addition:

☒ The Pupil Premium funding provides additional funding for pupils who are claiming Free School Meals, who are in the care of the local authority or whose parents are in the Armed Services. The deployment of this funding is published on the school website.

19) How is the decision made about how much support each child will receive?

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- For pupils with SEND but without an EHCP, the decision regarding the support provided will be taken at joint meetings with the SENCo, class teacher and parent who will follow guidance provided by the Governing Body regarding SEN Funding deployment.
- For pupils with a statement of educational need/EHCP, this decision will be reached in agreement with parents when the EHCP is being produced or at an annual review.

20) How will I be involved in discussions about and planning for my child's education?

This will be through:

- Discussions with the class teacher, SENCo or senior leadership team member,
- During parents evenings and SEN reviews
- Meetings with support and external agencies.
